ARH 201 ART OF ASIA

Ellie Laughlin, M.L.A.

Course Description:

This course traces the development of artistic expression in China, Japan, India, and Thailand. Tracing the major historic periods and movements, we will identify the basic characteristics of the arts of China and India as well as their respective spheres of influence, Japan and Thailand. We will analyze individual works of art within each cultural tradition and discuss how each work reflects aesthetic, philosophical, religious, and social ideals of the artist or culture that produced the work. In addition, we will explore cross-cultural influences and adaptations of styles/ movements between major cultural traditions.

In this course, the student should acquire an understanding of:

- **S** the richness of the Asian artistic tradition, its roots and developments;
- **S** the significance and relevance of Asian art to contemporary North Americans.

Course Requirements:

There will be two examinations: a midterm and a final exam. In addition, two papers will be assigned: a visual analysis and a short research paper. The student will be required to make a brief presentation of the topic of his/her final paper. Specific guidelines for papers will be discussed in class.

Students are expected to attend class regularly and participate in discussions of assigned readings. Papers must be submitted on time. Papers will lose $\frac{1}{2}$ of a letter grade each week or half of a week they are late. Anyone absent from an exam without a prior excuse discussed with me will be required to write a 10 page, typed take-home exam.
