




























A Welcome from the President

How Do I Register?

Step 1: Complete Student Information Form

A Student Information Form, available at Admissions and Records (A & R) during office hours, must be on file with that office prior to Assessment and Advisement.

See pages 12 and 13 for additional information.

 Who Needs to Complete a Student Information Form? New students and returning students who have not attended Phoenix College since Summer 2003. Forms are available at Admissions and Records during regular hours.

Special Note: A special application is required for the Health Occupation curriculums. Submit an application to the Program Advisor for Health Professions and Nursing in the Advisement Center. Students will be notified by letter regarding acceptance to the program.

Step 2: Complete Assessment

New and returning students must take a district approved placement test if:

- enrolling in English, reading or mathematics courses.
- if placement tests were taken more than two years ago.
- you do not have a high school diploma or GED and wish to apply for federal financial aid while enrolled in an eligible degree or certificate program.

Step 3: Seek Advisement

Academic advisement is available prior to and during registration periods. Students are encouraged to seek advisement early.

Advisement is recommended for all students and required for all students who are:

- receiving financial aid or veterans' benefits.
- working toward a degree or certificate.
- registering for EMT, FSC, and special permission courses.

Step 4: Submit Registration/ Advisement Form

Complete and submit a Registration/ Advisement Form, available at Admissions and Records during office hours and printed in this schedule on pages 11-12. Registration dates and locations are listed on page 3, or call 602-285-7800 for more information.

Step 5: Pay Tuition and Fees

Tuition and fees are due by the date indicated on your student schedule/invoice. Payment may be made by cash, check, money order, Visa, Discover, MasterCard, American Express, or with financial aid resources. See page 9 for tuition chart and information.

Step 6: Obtain Parking Decal

All vehicles must be registered with the Safety Office and display a current parking decal. Parking decal's are free.

Emissions Compliance: Beginning January 1, 1989, all students must sign an affidavit on the Registration/Advisement Form (see page 11) at the time of registration stating their vehicles are in compliance with emissions inspection guidelines. Vehicles not in compliance cannot be parked on college property.

Step 7: Obtain Photo I.D. Card

New I.D. cards may be obtained in the Student Life & Leadership office beginning May 23, 2005 for Summer and August 8, 2005 for Fall during the following times:

Paid fee receipts, plus a picture I.D. (driver's license, military I.D., etc.) are required to pick up student I.D. There is no charge for your initial card, which is valid for three years, provided you are currently enrolled. Update stickers are no longer required. Replacement cards are \$5. For more information, call 602-285-7231.

Students are strongly encouraged to consult with an advisor prior to registration. It is assumed that students registering by phone, mail, or FAX have received or waived advisement and are responsible for their own course selection. Registration may be subject to cancelation if appropriate prerequisite has not been completed as listed in the Phoenix College Catalog.

Placement Scores and Course Recommendations



- 3. It is your responsibility to withdraw from class. If you do not officially withdraw, you may receive a failing grade and may be held accountable for all tuition and fees charged for course enrollment. See page 3 for withdrawal dates.
- 4. If you need to withdraw completely from the college, you must file your complete withdrawal (with instructor's signature) at the Office of Admissions and Records. See page 3 for withdrawal dates.

Note: Dates will vary for short-term classes.

How Do I Get Transcripts From Other Colleges Evaluated?

If a student wishes to have a transcript from another school evaluated for transfer credits, the student must:

- Request an official transcript from the previous school(s) attended to be sent to Phoenix College, Admissions and Records. (Please note, the transcript must be mailed, not faxed, and sent directly to Phoenix College from the previous school(s).
- The student must contact the Admissions
 Office at Phoenix College to verify receipt of
 the transcript and to request that it be
 evaluated.
- The Admissions Office will send the evaluation results to the student approximately three weeks after the student's request.
- 4. The student must contact their advisor for review of the evaluation and degree requirements.



How Do I Get My Books and Supplies?

The bookstore management recommends that you purchase your books as early as possible. However, for English and open entry courses you should attend your first class session before purchasing your books.

Refunds- New and used textbooks may be returned for refund within 14 days from the official start of the semester with sales receipt. After that time, a twobusiness-day period is given. Courses cancelled by the school are always eligible for full refund with original sales receipt within 2 weeks from the scheduled start date. General merchandise is refundable in original (unopened) condition within 14 days of purchase with original sales receipt. Refunds will be honored only when they are accompanied by the proper sales receipt. All refunds, however, will be subject to the discretion of store personnel. No refunds during the last week of classes.

Payment- The bookstore accepts cash, check (must be an imprinted check with Arizona Driver's license/ID and a second form of Identification), Visa, Mastercard, Discover/Novus and American Express. All payments by check are at the discretion of the store management. If a financial aid award is made and funds are available for book purchase, a charge may be made against your financial aid account.

Buyback- Depending on market value, the bookstore buys back books year-round. The best time to sell back books is at the end of the semester.

Information Literacy Learning

The student will be able to recognize when information is needed, identify appropriate types of information, and locate, evaluate, and use information effectively, ethically, and legally.

Students will use numerical concepts and data effectively.

Critical Thinking

Phoenix College students will learn to examine the parts of an issue to clarify the whole, judge the value of two or more things or ideas that are put side by side, and identify a trend or line of reasoning and its consequences.

REFUND POLICY

Students who officially withdraw from credit classes (in fall, spring, or summer) within the withdrawal deadlines listed below will receive a 100% refund for tuition, class and registration processing fees. Deadlines that fall on a weekend or a college holiday will advance to the next college workday except for classes 1-9 calendar days in length or as specified by the college. Withdrawal deadlines for a 100% refund will be printed on the student invoice. Calendar days include weekdays and weekends.

^{*} Course fees and registration processing fees will be refunded only if the student qualifies for a 100% refund.

All refunds and deposits that may be due a student will first be applied to debts owed to the college.

Refunds for students receiving federal financial assistance are subject to federal guidelines.

Official Withdrawal

A withdrawal is official upon receipt in the Admissions & Records Office, as of the date received. Failure to attend selected courses may or may not result in your withdrawal from courses, or eligibility for refund.

Please call (602) 285-7502.

Students who officially withdraw from courses in the Admissions & Records Office within these deadlines are eligible for a refund of appropriate tuition and fees. Refunds are processed and distributed by Cashiers Office.

Refund distribution is not always automatic. Refunds MAY be requested in person or by phone at (602) 285-7522. All students who officially withdraw from the college or individual classes (in fall, spring, or summer) by the withdrawal process set forth in the catalog will receive a refund based on the refund policy. (Deadlines that fall on a weekend or a college holiday will advance to the next college workday.)

Refund Guidelines

In accordance with the policies of the Governing Board of the Maricopa County Community College District, the College is authorized to make full or partial refunds to those students who meet one of the following.

Refund Policy For Non-credit Classes

Unless otherwise specified, students must drop non-credit classes prior to the class start data to be eligible for a 100% refund.

Canceled Classes

When a class is canceled by the college, a 100% refund will be made.

Other Refunds

Students withdrawing from college for one of the following reasons must submit a written request for a refund to the Office of Admissions and Records or designated college official.

- 1. A student with a serious illness, verifiable by a doctor's written statement that the illness prevents the student from attending all classes for the semester. The doctor's statement must be on file with the college before a refund can be given.
- 2. Serious illness or death of a family member that prevents the student from attending all classes for the semester. Appropriate documentation must be provided before a refund can be given.
- 3. Death of a student. Appropriate documentation must be provided before a refund can be given.

Requests for a total withdrawal from the college for one of the above reasons may result in a prorated refund of tuition, provided courses have not been completed.

A student in the Armed Forces or the Arizona National Guard who is called to active duty and assigned to a duty station, verifiable by a copy of the orders, will be allowed to withdraw and receive a 100% refund of tuition, provided courses have not been completed.

Obtaining a Refund

Refunds of check payments will be made only after 30 days after posting of the applicable payment(s). Earlier processing is possible upon presentation of evidence of successful clearance of the payment. Such evidence may include a canceled check, bank statement, etc. DO NOT BYPASS THE REFUND PROCESS BY PLACING A 'STOP PAYMENT' ON A CHECK MADE PAYABLE TO THE COLLEGE (see Fees and Debt Policy in the current College Catalog).

Refunds of credit card payments are made only to the credit card on which the original payment was processed.

Refunds of cash and check payments are made and issued only in check form. No refunds of cash are available.

ALL REFUNDS IN THE FORM OF A CHECK WILL BE MAILED. Refunds sent by mail will be sent to the address of record on file with the College.

Financial Aid Check Distribution

The Cashiers Office will mail grant, scholarship, and EFT (Electronic Funds Transfer) Federal Stafford Loan checks up to ten days before classes begin if you meet the following criteria:

- You have a grant or scholarship award for the semester.
- You are enrolled in the proper credit hours for which you were awarded a grant or scholarship.
- All of your classes begin the first week of the semester.
- You are in a program of study that is eligible for federal financial aid.
- You have provided Admissions and Records with a current Maricopa County address.
- You have maintained the standards as outlined in the Procedures for Satisfactory Academic Progress for Financial Aid Eligibility.
- Your grant and/or scholarship award(s) is/are more than your costs for the semester.
- You are not a first time borrower and you have attended the required loan entrance session.

If any of the above does not apply, the financial aid check may not be available for immediate mailing.

First-time freshman borrowers are required to wait until 30 days after classes have been in session before their Federal Stafford or Perkins Loan checks are mailed.

Residency

Residency is determined at the time the Student Information Form is submitted. Students under 18 years of age may be assigned the dependent residency status of their parents or legal guardians. Students 18 years of age or over may be assigned residency based on their own proof of legal residence.

Out-of-County/Out-of-State students should note that

RESIDENCY IS NOT CHANGED AUTOMATICALLY. Proper documentation must be filed, reviewed, and approved before residency status will be changed. For further information, contact the Office of Admissions and Records.




MATHEMATICS FLOWCHART

This flowchart is an information tool and is not intended to replace consultation with an advisor. Begin at the math level indicated by math placement scores and/or prior math experience.






