

#### BRYN CHANCELLOR Summer Slump? Get Thee to a Writers' Conference

#### WORKSHOP February 5 (Saturday) 9:00 a.m. to 11 a.m. B125 Phoenix College Campus

Summer writers' conferences are an often overlooked but excellent option for creative writers. On a professional level, these conferences bring in some of the finest writers in the country to teach in small, intense workshop settings, and many offer access to the business side of writing (agents, editors, publishing). On a personal level, they are inspiring, full of creative energy, chaos, and companionship. In this workshop, you'll learn how to find conferences according to your needs—be it a specific teacher, location, cost, or time-frame—and how to put together a strong application package.

**Bryn Chancellor's** fiction has appeared or is forthcoming in <u>Blackbird</u>, <u>Cutbank</u>, <u>Phoebe</u>, <u>Colorado Review</u>, <u>The Cream City</u> <u>Review</u>, and <u>Crazyhorse</u>. Her awards and honors include a fellowship and a project grant from the Arizona Commission on the Arts, a nomination for Best New American Voices, a Tennessee Williams Scholarship from the Sewanee Writers' Conference, and the David R. Sokolov Scholarship from the Bread Loaf Writers' Conference. She holds an MA in English literature and teaches creative writing and composition at Phoenix College.

#### JIMMY BERLIN The Comedy Inside the Tragedy

Humor allows us to navigate the examination and exploration of pain and tragedy in poetry and fiction. In this workshop, we will examine examples of poetry and fiction for this combination and discuss the execution of this delicate balance.



#### RENEE RIVERS Writing Our Inner Geography: Explore How Travel and Cultural Experiences Create Maps within the Self

#### WORKSHOP March 5 (Saturday) 9:00 a.m. to noon B125 Phoenix College Campus

For many writers, travel often stirs a connection between a place and one's self. What are the experiential bridges that build these connections? Likewise, as writers, we each have our own inner geography, which can be tapped and explored. How does travel change this? Using real, imagined, or undiscovered travels, we will embark on a series of exercises to unearth this personal imagery and so contribute to our personal maps. There will be selected readings from published nonfiction authors who successfully illuminate the paths between place and self.

**Renee Rivers** holds an MA in College Composition and Rhetoric with a focus in creative nonfiction and personal memoir. She also holds a BA in German from Germany's prestigious Goethe Institut and numerous Arizona teaching certifications in Music, German, English, ESL, and Adult Education. At SUNY Brockport, she received the English Department's Scholarship. Selections from Rivers' Alaska memoirs have been published with her travel photography, which has also been displayed in galleries and banks in Germany. Her passion for travel, writing, and photography has caused her to take root in rural Alaska and Germany and to travel extensively in Europe and South America.



#### LARAINE HERRING Introduction to the Archetypes: The Creator

According to Carl Jung, archetypes are "deep and abiding patterns in the human psyche that remain powerful and present over time. We experience archetypes in dreams, art, literature, and myth, as well as in our personal lives." This experiential workshop will provide you with a brief introduction to the archetypes, with a focus on one archetype, The Creator, who figures powerfully in our lives as writers. We'll discuss the characteristics of this archetype, how it shows up, how it helps and how it can get in our way. Come with an open mind, prepared to discover and uncover the unexpected.

Whether we're looking at sentence structure, diction, or parodying great authors, we'll have fun selecting those features that distinguish one writer from the next.


#### SARAH VAP

Avant-Garde? Gertrude Stein? Poetic Experimentation

#### WORKSHOP April 16 (Saturday) 9:00 a.m. to noon B125 Phoenix College Campus

Perhaps you've heard the saying that all poetry is experimental? Well, some is more experimental than others. Some poetry truly pushes the envelope to the point of being accused of incomprehensibility. Other poetic experimentation opens wide doors of expression and comprehension never before available. In this workshop, we will look at some fairly radical experimentation and see if we can make sense of it. We will look at how these poets change line, diction, syntax, and even the page in order to ... what? We will also try some of our own radical experimentation in this workshop and see how we think it changes, contributes to, or depletes our own poetic project.

**Sarah Vap** will receive her MFA Degree in Creative Writing at ASU in May 2005. A recipient of the ASU Graduate Scholar Award for 2001-2004, she teaches English composition courses and poetry creative writing courses at Phoenix College and ASU. She is an associate poetry editor at *Hayden's Ferry Review* and a recipient of an Arizona Commission on the Arts Professional Development Grant in 2002 that allowed her to travel to Lithuania for the Europos Parkas Artists' Residency Program this past summer. She won first place in the 2003 Writer's Voice Poetry Competition.



#### **DR. LISA MILLER**

No Bigger Than a Licorice Whip: The Thin Line Between History and Fiction in American Literature

#### Panel Discussion April 8 (Friday) 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Green Room/T101 East side of Theatre Building Phoenix College Campus

Join us for this lecture and panel discussion, a collaborative event sponsored by the PC Creative Writing Program, the PC Honors Program, and the One Book PC Learning Grant. Dr. Miller will discuss various blendings of and distinctions between history and fiction in popular American literature, focusing on this year's One Book Arizona, which turned out to be two books on the same event. <u>Sunk without a Sound</u> by Brad Dimock, is the nonfiction account of a tragic honeymoon trip down the Colorado River. <u>Grand Ambition</u>, by Lisa Michaels, is a novel based on the same story.

Dr. Lisa Miller, founder of the Phoenix College Creative Writing Program, teaches a variety of humanities and literature classes as well as classes on writing children's literature.

#### JULI HENSHAW Revision Nuts and Bolts

In this workshop, we will discuss revision as a fundamental component of the writing process. We will discuss methods and practice exercises to get us started and to pull us through.
